Money, Money, Money

At a recent committee meeting we discussed the healthy balance sitting in our bank account amounting to just over £19,000. But perhaps it wasn't so healthy after all? How had it come there and did we want to keep it?

The General Reserve (about £15,000) has arisen as an accumulation of small surpluses arising each year from the events, lectures, outings that we organise. Obviously when planning these activities, we do not want lose money on any of them, but is it desirable to have this considerable sum in the bank? The Show Reserve (about £4,000) again has arisen from regular surpluses from the large show on the Green, occasionally losing money if torrential rain fell. This year we made a small loss on our smaller show but it is probable that it will roughly break even in future, if the weather is no worse than grey! We should keep some funds in the Show Reserve in case some wonderful person wanted to start the large show again, but perhaps we should give some away as we always tell people that the surplus is given to charity? If so, which charities and how much?

Please do give some thought to this and let us know your views; better still come to the AGM on 15th March and let's discuss this. 17 May - *KHS Summer Party*

As last year, we are holding the Summer Party at the Priory Park Tennis Club. There will be a cash bar and canapes and other nibbles will be served. This is always a wonderful opportunity to meet other members in a highly attractive setting. In addition, as always, there will be a plant stall. 20 May - *KHS Trip to Snowdonia*

This is now fully booked and has a waiting list. 5 days are to be spent looking at gardens in Snowdonia with Tony Russell. The climate and landscape make for unusual and dramatic gardens and so this should be a real treat.

19 June - *A Coach Trip to Wisley (plus an optional behind the Scenes tour)*

The gardens at Wisley will be looking their best at midsummer and as a society affiliated to the Royal Horticultural Society, KHS is able to organize a visit with free entry. The cost of transport by coach is £15 per person. As an optional extra we can arrange a 'Behind the Scenes tour' of Wisley Laboratory showing areas not accessible to the public. There is an extra charge of £15 a person for a 90 minute tour to see their Science Library, Entomology, Pathology and Botany departments. A member of the team will explain the work they do to support the charitable remit of the RHS. Provided 10 of our group apply the visit can go ahead, but there is a maximum of 15 so apply early.

This coach trip is also open to friends and relations for an additional charge of £5 a person, which in effect means they join Kew Horticultural Society for 2019. We aim to have a relaxed day out with a departure time of 10 am. The journey should take well under an hour and we expect to get back to Kew by 5.30 pm. Please apply on the application form which is attached at the end of this newsletter. A new Welcome Building has been under construction at Wisley for the last two years. Opening is due in May so we hope to be some of the first visitors to experience the new 100-seater café and restaurant, an expanded indoor plant centre and gift shop.

24 August - *KHS Summer Show*

We have been fortunate in securing St Anne's Church Hall as last year for the summer show. While of course details will be sent to you nearer the time put the date in your diary now.

Crocus corms

KHS members may recall that as an affiliated member of the RHS the KHS acquired 1000 crocus corms from the RHS for community projects. KHS shared the corms equally between The Kew Society, who planted them at the station, The Pensford Field Environmental Trust who planted theirs in the walkway into their field and ourselves. We chose to plant them at St Anne's Church Kew Green by way of a thank you to them for hosting our Summer Show. The entire endeavour was done in a partnership between the RHS and The Rotary Club of Great Britain to raise funds for

charity. Accordingly a group of KHS members armed with trowels and bulb planters descended on St Anne's late last year to plant the corms. The trick was to plant them in places that the mower could not reach but where those visiting the Church were likely to see them and enjoy them. In addition the Church Warden asked us to plant them in a way that was 'aesthetically pleasing.' A demanding brief I think you will agree but we did our best. So now if you go to St Anne's you will have to keep an eye out for blooms in the corners and nooks and crannies between the grave stones. While at work we got a kindly visit from Father Nigel and as always the efficiency of the KHS members shone through because it took only just over an hour to plant about 300 corms.

Six degrees of Separation?

There is a back story to this poem and our contact with Grace Dives. Margaret Blair Gould sent the poem to Ann Sandall, our Chair. Ann suggested at the last KHS Committee meeting that we print the poem in the newsletter, because

she thought it funny and attractive and also because KHS members enjoy the coach trips that we arrange. It was agreed, however, that to do this we first had to secure the permission of the poet. Ann asked the Committee if anyone knew Grace Dives. Ann Scurfield recalled that in about 1978 she had heard a singer called Grace Dives perform at a concert and she would try and find her. Eventually, Grace was tracked down through Calibre, the audio books charity mentioned above. Thus, a lovely voice, that had remained an enduring memory for 40 years, meant that Ann and Grace made contact and Grace kindly gave permission for us to print her poem.

Gardening and Climate Change

I suspect like others of you I still have roses in bloom in my garden. They have been flowering almost continuously since June. Until the recent cold snap, I also had cosmos and dahlias in flower. Luckily, I brought my pelargoniums inside, also still in flower, just in time. Last Autumn my flowering cherry was shedding its leaves while at the same time putting out a scattering of blossoms, that properly should arrive in the spring. A world turned upside down.

I began to wonder what the right response was to this behaviour. Would the long flowering period exhaust and weaken the plants? Should I feed them more vigorously when the growing season starts or feed them more than once during the summer? I asked the Henry Doubleday Research Foundation for their advice with the thought that I would pass it on as I thought other KHS members might find useful.

Sally Cunningham responded as follows: 'Do not feed plants which are in flower now, because this will only encourage them into growth further during the winter months, when they should be resting. The low levels of light in winter prevent plants from being able to utilize any nutrients in the soil (there is a spell of around 6 weeks near mid winter, when even in warm conditions plants cease to grow because of insufficient daylight), so feeding them won't help. Soft growth caused by rich feeding once the light improves will be very liable to frost damage, so you are much better waiting until things are really starting to grow away properly in late March to May, depending on where you live and feed then with a mulch of garden compost or a slow release substance such as bone meal or a balanced organic fertilizer.

This general view was also endorsed by Lorna Sinnamon of www.gardenadvice.co.uk who added that any flowering plants such as pelargoniums and campanula should be dead headed to allow the plant to put its energy into producing more robust growth rather than flowers, and that roses need to be pruned now to keep the plants open and ready to flower next season.

The Quiz - Friday 8th February

The new teams, in their different ways, turned out to be the stars of the event. One new team, The Argy Bargies which was a family team, gave the KHS a very generous donation which was most kind and suggests they were having a very good time. They pipped The President's Team, headed by David Collison, to the post in a sudden death play off because at the end of the Quiz both were tied in first position. As usual Richard Ward was in charge of the bar in his

Did you hear about the Kew Gardens monthly Health Walks?

Kew Gardens are offering free monthly health walks for people living nearby, either a gentle stroll or a more exhilarating brisker walk. Free entry to the Gardens is included. The walks are led by Kew's volunteer walk leaders and take place on the first Wednesday of each month at 11 am and last about an hour. They start from Victoria Gate and have a focus each month on a certain subject, perhaps a plant like lavender or roses. So, there you are, the KHS appears to be on a par with the MCC and the Royal Academy in terms of lustre and reputation. Personally, I am not at all surprised.


