Report on the Annual Show

The Annual Show on the Saturday of August Bank Holiday weekend was a bigger event than usual, thanks above all to the organising skills of our new show secretary, Philippa Hurman, and all those who so willingly gave up their time and energy to form part of her team, both on the day and beforehand. There were plenty of stalls, as well as the barbeque and tea tent, stretching right round the green in front of the marquee. (The general increase in trading was due in part to the absence of the other autumn fair that used to take place in previous years).

The central matter of the show, around which all these sideshows spring up, is of course the exhibiting of fruit, vegetables, flowers, preserves, cakes, photography, handicrafts and children's categories. The idea of encouraging more entries by making it free, proved a good one - the marquee was full of interest, and the extra visitor numbers made the display even more worthwhile. Finances

Jenny Kidd's tea tent in particular increased its takings to £1200, thanks to generous contributions of home-made cakes, and David Collison's auction at the end of the show, as well as being wonderfully entertaining, made almost £900, of which £375 came from the relentless bidding for 3 pots of lemon curd. Other KHS stalls had takings as follows; Books £276; BBQ £793; Bric a brac £853; Pickles £203; Plants £118; Raffles £450; Tombola £209; Swing boats £45. Thanks to the generosity of Priory Management in paying for the band, Jazz a la Carte, the overall surplus on the day, after deductions for the cost of the marquee etc, was over £2000, more than double the previous year, and the distribution to local charities will – as usual – be discussed at the AGM on Thursday 11 March. These figures are of course subject to the payment of any outstanding expenses & audit.
