# **The Summer Show**

While not exactly a <u>total</u> washout, the 2013 Summer Show was the victim of dreadful weather for the second year running, obliging us to draw on our reserves to pay the bills. Once again KHS stall holders and the prize-giving had to take refuge in the marquee. In 2011 the Show made a profit of almost £1000, allowing us to make our usual donations to local charities. In 2012, owing to the downpour and gale-force winds we showed a loss of £1000. This year, despite a truly marvellous display of flowers, fruit and vegetables in the marquee and a successful auction which included an original watercolour of Short Lots generously donated by the artist, Colleen Farr, which fetched £500, we lost a further £900.

2014 will mark the **70**<sup>th</sup> **Summer Show** and the Show Committee are determined to make it a memorable event. We can't legislate for the weather, but as an experiment it has been decided to break with tradition and avoid the August Bank Holiday weekend, when so many families are away. So next year the Show will be held on **Saturday 30**<sup>th</sup> **August**, in the hope that we will attract many more visitors, make it a great Anniversary Show and put ourselves back in the black! # **Rouen and the Gardens of Normandy**

# 1-5 May 2014

# **Proposed Itinerary**

### Thursday 1 May 2014

We depart from your local area early this morning and travel by coach to Dover to catch a P&O Ferries sailing to Calais. Lunch is available on board the ferry (not included). On arrival in France we continue to our hotel, the **Hôtel du Vieux Marché**, conveniently located in the centre of Rouen. Dinner is served in a nearby local restaurant this evening.

## Friday 2 May 2014

After breakfast this morning we travel north to the beautiful gardens at **Le Bois des Moutiers** on the northern coast, near Dieppe. The garden, in part influenced by the English designer Gertrude Jekyll, is full of charm. Near the house a white garden, held in check by disciplined box hedges, is full of white valerian, Iceberg roses, white irises and other ghostly plants. One can amble through the glades whose themes, colours and scents vary enormously in one of the most beautiful landscapes of the region.

After a leisurely lunch in a local restaurant in nearby Dieppe (not included), we visit the **Château de Miromesnil**, which represents four centuries of harmonious architectural styles including a rare example of Louis XIII monumental style. Of particular interest will be the kitchen garden which was restored forty years ago by the Comtesse de Vogüé, grand-mother of the present owners. Separated by alleys made of grass, the squares are ordered with vegetables and flowers that contrast with the profusion of annual flowers on the sides. The surrounding park is dominated by a cedar of Lebanon, several centuries old, and there are also fruit trees, magnolias and a huge collection of clematis.

We return to Rouen where dinner is served in a nearby local restaurant this evening.

### Saturday 3 May 2014

After breakfast this morning, we visit a rare example of pure Louis XIII architectural style, **Château de Bosmelet**, which was built in 1632 and still stands at the apex of 300 year-old lime tree avenues planted out to classical French designs. Of particular interest will be the rainbow potager garden with some 900 varieties of vegetables and flowers in four chromatic patterns on either side of a central boxwood hedge.

Following our visit we will have a leisurely lunch in a local restaurant in the nearby seaside town of Varengeville-sur-Mer (not included). In the afternoon we will visit the **Jardins Agapanthe**. There are two gardens and a nursery here, with many interesting and unusual features, including a scented walk, a sunken garden with lavender, a Mediterranean garden with ponds, a pergola, terraces and a fountain.

Dinner is served in a nearby local restaurant this evening.

### Sunday 4 May 2014

This morning, following breakfast, we depart for Giverny and the world famous house and gardens of **Claude Monet**. Our early start today will ensure an early arrival at Giverny - a time when the gardens are at their most tranquil. Both the house and gardens have been lovingly and accurately restored - one would believe that the family have just gone out to walk in the garden. You will have plenty of time to explore this marvellous garden at your leisure.

After an opportunity for lunch (not included) we will visit the **Musée des Impressionnismes** in Giverny, which as well as charting the story of Impressionist painting has its own attractive little garden. Following our visit we will enjoy free time in Giverny along with an opportunity to visit the little church where Monet is buried.

Later we return to Rouen, where dinner is served in a local restaurant this evening.

## Monday 5 May 2014

Today, following breakfast, we check out of our hotel and begin our homeward journey, but before we leave Normandy we have time for one more visit, the **Jardin de Plume.** Since 1997, Sylvie and Patrick Quibel have been creating this natural yet structured contemporary garden in a typical Normandy orchard. Making generous use of grasses and perennials, this four acre garden includes seasonal plantings, a central square mirror pool, and a kitchen garden.

Following our visit we return to Calais for our crossing with P&O Ferries to Dover. Refreshments are available on board (not included). On arrival in Dover we return to our original departure point, where arrival is due in the evening.
