VISIT TO CHENIES MANOR AND CLIVEDEN - THURSDAY 7th September

Chenies is the MacLeod Matthews family home, a Tudor manor house which was originally built in 1460 with a fortified tower and stepped gables. The five beautiful acres of garden are especially famous for dahlias, cosmos and salvias in late summer. The gardens feature a Tudor sunken garden, herbaceous borders, a fountain court and physic garden. In addition there is a Victorian kitchen garden and maze. Plenty to explore for an afternoon finishing with a visit to the tearooms. On the way to Chenies we stop at Cliveden, mainly for lunch but also for a stroll around the five formal gardens and many more acres of woodlands! (National Trust members bring your membership cards, non-members pay on the day.)

PROGRAMME:

10.00 am	Leave Kew Green, just near the Botanist
11.00	Arrive at Cliveden with free time to visit the gardens and have an early lunch
1.15 pm	Leave to travel on to Chenies
2.00	Arrive at Chenies. Our entry fee includes a 40 minute guided tour of the house. It may be necessary to split into two groups for this with approx. 20 mins between tours. Don't forget to visit the tea rooms.
4.45	Depart. It is about 25 miles to Kew and we hope to be back shortly after 6 pm depending on traffic.
