Message from the Committee

Trip to Waterperry and Oxford Botanic Gardens - Tuesday June 9th 2020 (Update 6/4/20 - Trip Cancelled)

Do join us for a day out in June! We have arranged visits to two gardens and some free time in Oxford. Details of times and costs are on the application form at the end of this newsletter.

Our first stop is Waterperry, a garden made famous by Beatrix Havergal who established her School of Horticulture

for Ladies between 1932 and 1971. It has 8 acres of beautifully landscaped ornamental gardens and is just 10 miles from Oxford. You'll find a plant centre and garden shop, gallery, gift shop and museum. The tea shop will be open for coffee or an early light lunch or you can wait for the many and varied choices in Oxford. We are able to offer a voluntary 45 minute guided tour of the garden if there is sufficient interest.

From here we travel the short distance to Oxford for free time before meeting at 2.30 to visit the oldest Botanic Gardens in the UK. With nearly 6,000 different types of plant, classic English herbaceous borders, a rock garden and glasshouses you will be relieved to find the pop-up Café near the River Cherwell which serves teas, cakes and ice cream. Finally don't miss the colourful Merton Borders, an example of sustainable horticultural development. They require no artificial irrigation, staking or fertilisers.

Committee Members' visits - Kew Community Garden & Chiswick Kitchen Garden Education projects

As members will no doubt remember, last year, the KHS gave grants of £1000 each to three local primary schools, Queens, Darrell and Riverside, and £3000 each to the Chiswick House and Gardens Trust for their Kitchen Garden Education Programme, and to the Kew Gardens Community Garden project which aims to encourage excluded people such as the homeless, refugees and those with disabilities to become actively involved in gardening. Towards the end of last year, members of the Committee were invited by the leaders of both the Kew and Chiswick projects to visit them to see exactly how the KHS money was being used.

The money given to the Community garden at Kew was specifically for the purchase of a poly tunnel, to enable the gardeners to propagate and grow a wider range of plants throughout the year, and this was what we were invited to see. So one afternoon at the end of October, several of us gathered at Lion Gate where we were met and guided to a

previously unnoticed allotment area inside the boundary wall only a few yards along from the gate. There we were introduced to Jane, the impressive and hugely energetic project leader, to other staff members, and to several of the gardeners, some of whom had come to Kew having spent the night sleeping on the streets, which was where they would be going back to at the end of the day. Some were delighted to be able to talk about their work there, proudly showing us what they grew, and then the dishes they cooked using their produce, but some were understandably reluctant to speak to us, and quietly continued with what they were doing. The poly tunnel was already in use, although it was at that point still unfinished, lacking the staging on each side, but Jane said that it would double the amount of produce in the year to come, and that they were tremendously grateful for it. Other than the poly tunnel, there were only gazebos for shelter. We were all very impressed by the importance of the work going on, and by the enthusiasm of the staff both paid and voluntary who have created a safe environment and a sense of achievement and purpose for people with a range of mental and emotional problems.

We also accepted an invitation from the Chiswick House and Gardens Trust coordinator Louise Randall to visit the Kitchen Garden Education project to see the work our gift was helping to fund there. It was a cold morning in late November, but to start with, we met a small Primary school group who were already in the large kitchen garden, and under the guidance of two volunteers, were obviously enjoying working their way round being introduced to all the different plants, and enthusiastically joining in a favourite activity, learning about bee keeping and trying on the bee keepers' suits. Inside in the classrooms, there were worksheets and activities, pictures and examples of plants, seeds, fruits and vegetables of all sorts, to help the children learn at first hand, not only about horticulture, but also all aspects of the natural environment and the importance of protecting it. Permanent staff members also work with the children, and it was good to think that before the KHS grant runs out at the end of March this year, it will have funded the sessions throughout last Autumn, and will enable Chiswick to offer a further four visits to local schools.

Two very interesting and inspiring visits, and the organisers and volunteers of both these projects were at great pains to express their sincere gratitude for the money they received, so THANK YOU, KHS! - Lyn Keay
